Junior High vs. High School

Junior High

- Classes are full year
- Content is delivered at a slower pace (full year)
- Attendance is important, but students have more time to make up missed classes
- Students move along with ageappropriate peer groups
- Course content can be modified for students, but courses are not streamed.
- Students can receive accommodations to support their learning

High School

- Classes run on semesters
- Content is delivered more quickly
- Attendance is important, and missing classes can have a negative impact on student achievement
- Students must pass a course to move on to the next level
- Course content cannot be modified, but courses are streamed.
- Students can receive accommodations to support their learning

ALBERTA HIGH SCHOOL DIPLOMA MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS

100 CREDITS

Earn a minimum of 100 credits. Successfully complete the following courses:

- English 30-1 or 30-2*; AND
- Social 30-1 or 30-2*; AND
- Math 20-1 or 20-2 or 20-3; AND
- Science 20 or Science 24 or Biology 20 or Chemistry 20 or Physics 20 or Science 14 and 10; AND
- Physical Education (PE) 10; AND
- Career and Life Management (CALM); AND

Earn 10 credits, in any combination:

- Career and Technology Studies (CTS) courses
- Fine and Performing Arts courses
- Second Languages* courses
- Physical Education 20 and/or 30
- Knowledge & Employability (K&E) courses
- Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) courses
- Locally Developed and Authorized courses in CTS, fine arts, second languages or K&E occupational courses AND

Earn 10 more credits, in any 30-level course (in addition to English 30-1 or 30-2 and Social 30-1 or 30-2) from:

- 30-level Math, Science, Fine Arts, Second Languages, or PE
- Advanced Level (3000 series) CTS courses
- 30-level Locally Developed and Authorized courses
- 30-level Work Experience courses
- 30-level Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) courses
- 30-level K&E courses
- 30-level Green Certificate courses

*IMPORTANT: You are encouraged to explore many options in high school; be sure to gain the prerequisites to complete the 10 credits in 30-level courses other than English and Social.

Provincial diploma exams are required for: English 30-1 & 30-2; French Language Arts 30-1; Social 30-1 & 30-2; Math 30-1 & 30-2 (in English or French); Science 30, Biology 30, Chemistry 30, and Physics 30. Final marks in these courses are a blend of school marks and the Diploma Exam marks (your Diploma Exam is worth 30%; your school mark is worth 70%).

ALBERTA CERTIFICATE OF HIGH SCHOOL ACHIEVEMENT MINIMUM REQUIREMENTS 80 CREDITS

Earn a minimum of 80 credits. Successfully complete the following courses:

- English 20-2 or Knowledge & Employability (K&E) English 30-4; AND
- Math 10-3 or K&E Math 20-4: AND
- Science 14 or K&E Science 20-4: AND
- Social 10-2 or K&E Social 20-4; AND
- Physical Education 10; AND
- Career and Life Management (CALM); AND

Earn 5 credits in:

- 30-level K&E occupational course, or
- 30-level Career and Technology Studies (CTS), [Advanced level–3000 series] or
- 30-level Locally Developed and Authorized course with an occupational focus

AND

Earn 5 credits in:

- 30-level K&E Workplace Practicum course, or
- 30-level Work Experience course, or
- 30-level Green Certificate Specialization course
- Special Projects 30

OR instead of the 10 credits in the section immediately above Earn 5 credits in:

30-level Registered Apprenticeship Program (RAP) course

IMPORTANT:

A Certificate of Achievement is NOT a high school diploma. K&E courses align with other courses to maximize opportunities for your success, to support your completion of high school, and to easily allow you to transfer to other courses. Such flexibility makes it possible to work toward achieving a High School Diploma. Another semester or year of high school may be part of your plan to do this.

- To qualify for a Certificate of High School Achievement, you successfully complete a minimum of 1 academic Knowledge & Employability (K&E) -4 course (English, Math, Science, or Social).
- A Certificate of High School Achievement can be earned in 2 4 years.
- Written consent is required to register in each K&E -4 course.

A High School Diploma is required for College or University entrance








Choosing Your Core Courses




Math



- Math 10C: for students who demonstrated Good or Excellent Achievement in Math 9, and are motivated to pursue postsecondary education. This course provides choices for you as you move to 20-level courses.
- Math 10-3: for students who did not meet all Grade 9 level expectations, or those interested in Workplace and Apprenticeship Mathematics
- Math 15: improve student mastery of grade
 9 mathematical skills, concepts and ideas;
 available in Summer School for grade 9


Science



- Science 10: for students who demonstrated Basic, Good or Excellent Achievement in Science 9, and are motivated to pursue postsecondary education. This course introduces biology, chemistry, physics, and global energy systems and allows you to choose from Biology, Chemistry, Physics, and/or Science at the 20-level.
- Science 14: for students who struggled to meet Grade 9 expectations, or those interested in Workplace and Apprenticeship. Applies scientific knowledge and skills to everyday general sciences.


English

- ELA 10-1: for students who demonstrated Good or Excellent Achievement in ELA
 9, and are motivated to pursue postsecondary education. Develops strong, comprehensive communication skills for university and post-secondary programs
- ELA 10-2: for students who
 have demonstrated Basic Achievement in ELA
 9. Develops your communication skills
 through practical, creative, and persuasive
 writing skills for some post-secondary
 education and Apprenticeship programs.



Social Studies

- SS 10-1: for students who demonstrated Good or Excellent Achievement in Social 9 and are motivated to pursue post secondary education.
- **SS 10-2:** for students who have demonstrated Basic or Good Achievement in Social 9. You will examine historical and contemporary aspects and relationships among citizenship, identity and globalization.

Why Advanced Placement?

- AP is a program run by the College Board that was officially launched in 1956
- This program offers high school students a chance to expand and enrich their knowledge in one-or-more areas of interest, and work toward earning university credit
- AP programming blends the requirements of the 30-level Alberta High School course outcomes with that of the AP board designated courses (ex. Chemistry30/35 cohort AP)

AP Seminar is a foundational course in which students explore the complexities of academic and real-world issues.


AP Research

AP Research allows students to deeply explore an academic topic, problem, issue, or idea of individual interest.

In addition to successfully passing AP Seminar (Year 1) and AP Research (Year 2), students must also take four additional AP exams, showcasing advanced academic ability.







High School GATE Programming

- Personalization- Students are known, respected and valued in a supportive learning environment
- Support- Teacher Advisor in a GATE cohort to support academic, peer and well-being connections.
- Enrichment- Advanced
 Placement Seminar group and self-directed learning opportunities.

High School Designation

Current grade 9 students will be automatically designated to their next year High School based on their home address in PowerSchool.

A transfer request can be made to another CBE high school for the next school year when a program or sequence of courses is not offered at their designated school, or when a student in an alternative program wants to return to their Regular Program community school (GATE).

The High School Transfer Process is open from February 10th to March 15, 2026.
